

- A BSW Community Grant of £500 aimed to engage audiences who are traditionally underrepresented and currently not engaged in science activity
- A grant of up to £350, designed to help Scottish or Welsh organisations run an event as part of British Science Week.

Turn bat detective

For British Science Week 2016, we are partnering with Zooniverse on the Bat Detective project. Bat Detective is a partnership between University College London, Zoological Society of London, The Bat Conservation Trust, BatLife Europe and University of Auckland.

Bat Detective is an audio visual citizen science project that asks people to identify bat calls. Humans are great at hearing and seeing the difference between a bat and a non-bat call, the different types of calls and what sequence a call belongs in. The Bat Detective project team needs your help to go through the sonograms and pick out the different calls.

We are aiming for 100,000 classifications during British Science Week 2016!
